Candles: A GLOWING Concern!

Voice Over: Length 30 seconds

Over the past few years, the use of candles in the home has greatly increased—and so has the number of fires caused by their misuse. The Ontario fire service offers the following tips for the safe use of candles.

Secure your candles in sturdy holders and, if possible, place glass chimneys or shades over them. Keep lit candles out of the reach of children and pets, and well away from any combustible materials. An unattended candle is an invitation to disaster, so don't forget to snuff out your candles before leaving the room or going to bed.

Remember to keep all matches and lighters out of the sight and reach of children. A message from the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council and this station.

Christmas Tree Safety

Voice Over: Length 30 seconds

The Ontario fire service wants you to enjoy the holiday season and offers a few tips for a fire-safe Christmas tree. Buy a freshly cut tree and keep the stand full of water at all times. Check all decorative lights before placing them on the tree and discard any frayed or damaged lights and cords. Lighted candles must *never* be placed on or near a Christmas tree. Keep your tree away from all heat sources. Christmas trees don't last forever: when the needles start to dry out, it's time to get rid of the tree.

Voice Over: Length 20 seconds

The Ontario fire service offers a few tips for a fire-safe Christmas tree. Your freshly-cut tree should be placed away from all heat sources and the stand should be full of water at all times. Lighted candles must *never* be placed on or near a Christmas tree. When the needles start to dry out, it's time to get rid of the tree.

A Dangerous Mix!

Voice Over: Length 30 seconds

It's a fact that many fire deaths are caused by people attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol. Unfortunately, their families are often victims as well. Alcohol and fire are a dangerous mix. A lit cigarette dropped on the couch or a forgotten pan of grease on the stove could mean disaster for you and your family. If someone in your household cooks or smokes while intoxicated, you must be aware of the risk. Keep a watchful eye on drinkers and make sure you have a working smoke alarm on every level of your home.

Remember December

Voice Over: Length 30 seconds

Last December, 18 people died in fires in Ontario, which is almost twice the monthly average. Eight of the victims were children, most of whom died needlessly. The real tragedy is that many of these fires were preventable.

This holiday season, the Ontario fire service urges you to keep a close eye on any drinkers in your household. Many fires are caused by people attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol. Check that all cigarettes are properly extinguished and the stove is off before going to bed. Make sure your smoke alarms are in good working order and that everyone in your home knows how to escape if a fire occurs. No one needs to die in a home fire—especially not you or your children. Remember—fire safety is **your** responsibility.
